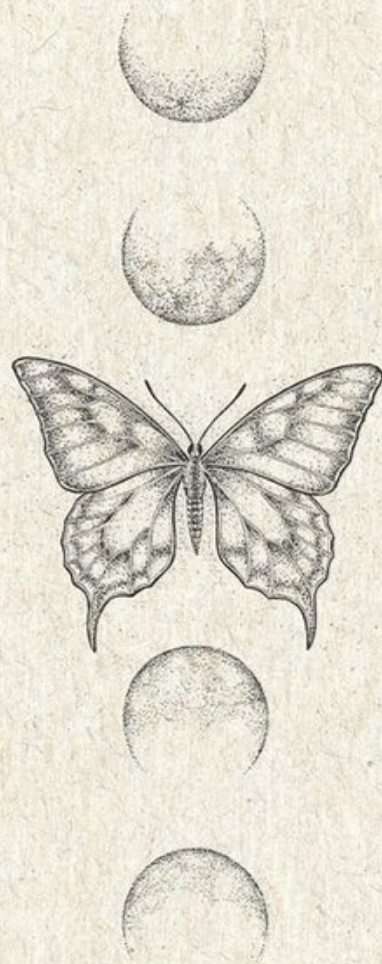
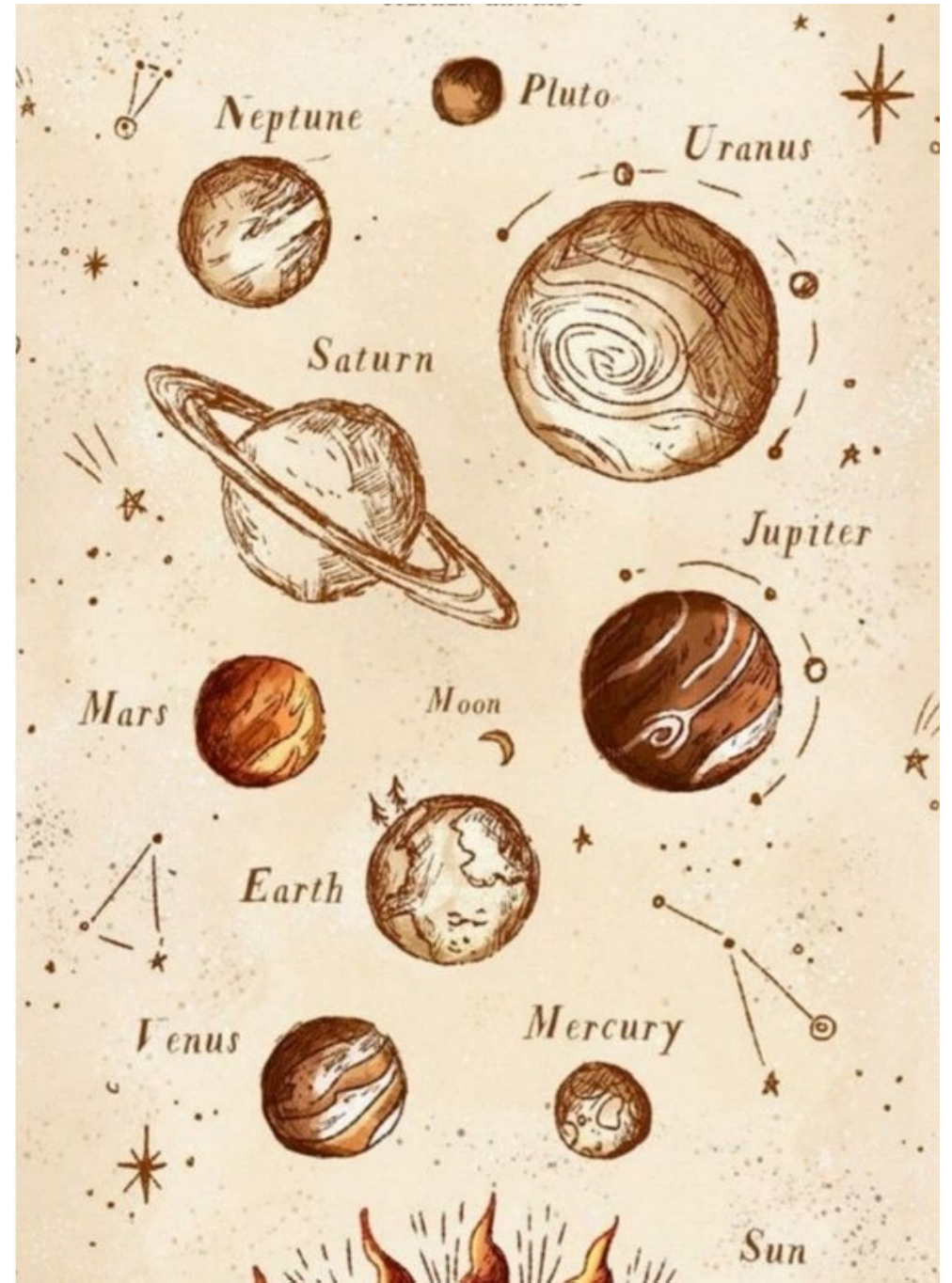

Ixias Ready in September

The flowers of the Ixias are produced in spikes, and are of many brilliant and dazzling shades. They are especially good for outside planting in window gardens. When grown in pots, use six or eight bulbs for a 4 inch pot, and otherwise treat same as other fall bulbs. Give plenty of water, sunshine and air when about to bloom and you will well be repaid for the small cost of the bulbs.

Jonquils Ready in September

Sometimes bulbils are called Jonquils, but this is wrong; Jonquils are smaller, very fragrant, and more delicate than most bulbils.

Single Jonquils—Single deep golden-yellow flowers, powerfully scented. Good for forcing. 2 for 5c.; doz., 15c.; 3 doz., 25c.

Double Jonquils—Double deep golden-yellow flowers, powerfully scented. Good for forcing. Each, 4c.; doz., 30c.

Campanelle—Large double yellow flowers. Best to six on a stem. 2 for 5c.; doz., 15c.

Regulons (Heart Jonquils)—Small jonquils, with broad tips. Pure yellow and very fragrant. Each, 3c.; doz., 25c.

Lilies

Arrival and Cashidem are ready in August. Other varieties not until October and November.

Very rightly named "Queen of Flowers." Of ineffable beauty and purity. They grow more popular each season. Many of them being hardy flowers, when once planted, they are good for years with little additional care.

Lilies for Bedding should be ordered as early as possible, to be forwarded immediately on receipt of bulbs. They require little care beyond that of protecting them well in winter by using a liberal supply of coarse manure or horse manure on the ground about the plant should be used in summer, so the tops of the bed can be broken them. A well-drained soil suits them best. Runners should be cut when in contact with the bulb. They should be planted about six inches deep. Our list is made up of varieties which are ready grown.

Pot Culture.—Put them in 3 or 4 inch pots, using a compost of one half rich loam and one fourth well rotted cow manure and one fourth of clean sharp sand; also some broken pieces of pots and charcoal in the bottom of pot for drainage. Place the bulb in the center of the pot.

AURATUM (Golden-Rayed Lily of Japan)—Hardy. Beyond question the grandest of all the Lily family. Flowers pure white, thickly spotted with crimson spots, while through the center of each petal runs a clear golden band. Fully expanded, the flowers are of very large size. They are produced abundantly from July to October, and produce a most delicious fragrance. Blooms about July 15th. First size bulbs, each, 25c., 6 for \$2.00. SPECIOSUM RUBRUM (Lancetleaf Rubrum)—Hardy. White, heavily spotted with rich crimson spots. The Speciosum and its varieties are magnificent border plants, and are also excellent for pot culture. Height about 3 feet. Blooms about August 15th. Each, 15c., 2 for 25c., postpaid.

SPECIOSUM ALBUM—Hardy. Pure white. Blooms about August 15th. Each, 15c., 2 for 25c., postpaid.

SPECIOSUM ROSEUM—Hardy. White, streaked and spotted with very rich rose. Height about 3 feet. Blooms about August 15th. Each, 15c., 2 for 25c., postpaid.

LONGIFOLIUM—Has long white trumpet-shaped blossoms. Excellent for growing in pots, also for bedding out, as it is quite hardy. It needs some protection, however, at the North. Blooms in June. Each, 15c., 2 for 25c., postpaid.

DOUBLE TIGER LILY (Tigris) *Floer Floer*—Hardy. Beautiful crimson flowers, spotted with white. Double and showy. Grows 4 to 6 feet in height, and begins blooming early in August. Each, 15c., postpaid.

CANDIDUM—Hardy. This beautiful garden Lily has pure white flowers, with heavy yellow stamens, and exquisite lily fragrance. Grows from 5 to 25 blossoms. Must be planted in early autumn in exposed well, as it requires the best soil at time of planting, and requires some protection during the winter. Begins blooming in June. A good forcing variety also. Fine bulbs, ready for planting, August to October. Each, 15c.; doz., \$1.50. 100, not prepaid, \$2.00.

TEMPERIFOLIUM—A very early sort having small scarlet blossoms before the other above 14 to 24 inches in height. Very early grown in pots, and a beauty for cutting. If planted earlier it need be well protected. Each, 25c.

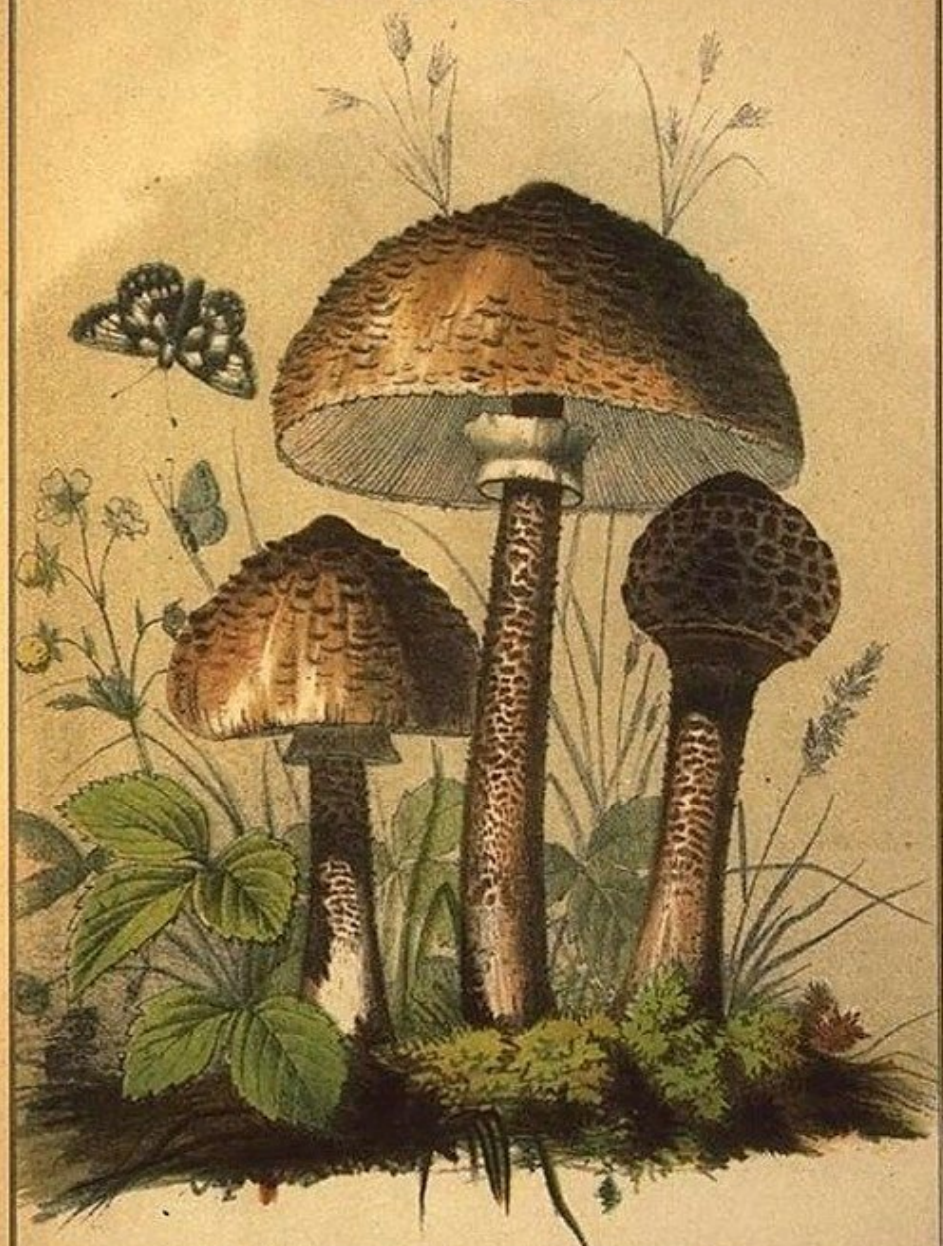
